Whakaahua Hāereere ki te Kura Travelling to School Montage



Teaching Resource Lesson 4 of 6 Year: 4-8

Class time: 60 mins
Prep time: 5 mins

What teachers need to know

This is Lesson 4 from a series of six lessons about connecting with our environment and people. See Te Hono Atu – Overview.

The purpose of this activity is to create a montage, either collaboratively or individually. Gather images of all the different ways people might use active travel to kura (school). This could be common methods of travel from the present day, from the past, or it could be creative, even futuristic.

The montage could be on a digital device, or pictures cut from magazines or drawn. Digital apps that could be used include; Explain Everything, Pic Collage, Padlet and Comic Life.

Teacher preparation:

- · Read through this resource.
- Prepare art materials for montage.



Learning intentions – students will:

- Know the different ways to active travel.
- Express an opinion.

Success criteria – students can:

- Create an image that displays methods of active travel.
- Express an opinion about how they feel about the way they get to kura and explain why.

 - My least favourite way to travel to kura is ...
 - I wonder if ...
